We began the process of mentoring new members to quickly bring them into Rotary leadership, and several have responded by joining our board of directors for 2004-2005

Rotary donates \$31,000 in 2003

The Rotary Club of Beaver do" 2d \$31,391 during 2002-2003 to support a variety of community groups for projects benefiting public and education needs and received six awards at the 2003 District Conference.

As part of Rotary's 20-year commitment to end polio by its 100th anniversary in 2005, Rotary International and its 1.2 million members raised more than \$88 million, surpassing its original goal of \$80 million. The Rotary Club of Beaver raised \$4,000 toward the effort, and \$9,700 was raised from a joint campaign with other Beaver County rotary clubs.



In Memoriam – Chalmer Kelley



On Feb. 7, 2004, Beaver Rotarian Chalmer Kelley passed away at the age of 90. Born before World War I, educated in a one-room school and married during the Great Depression, he was someone special whose life example was treasured by us all. He joined the old Rochester Rotary in 1950, and was president and treasurer. The club helped support the old Epileptic Home in Rochester (now the Passavant Memorial Homes). He later joined the Beaver Club in 1954, where he was treasurer three times.

In a remarkable gesture, Chalmer showed his great appreciation to Rotary by making a provision in his will to donate funds to the Rotary International Foundation's permanent endowment. It was his desire that the earned income will be paid out to the Beaver Rotary Club to provide funding for projects of the board's choosing.
