Message from 2005-2006 Governor Joel Nagel



The 2005-2006 year was one in which we can all be proud. We engaged local and global communities in so many different ways (both planned and unplanned). The Katrina Relief Campaign raised unprecedented amounts of money for victims of that catastrophe. Many Rotarians not only made financial contributions but rolled up their sleeves and went to work alongside Rotarians on the Mississippi coast, helping people of all walks to rebuild their lives.

Globally, Rotarians worked hard to bring clean drinking water to the one billion people who do not currently have access to clean water. Our "Clean Water for All" Campaign will touch the lives of many people all over the world. Our Nicaraguan initiative seeks to change the way aide and relief work are conducted and bring about systemic change by adopting a rural community and attempting to tackle many of its needs including health, poverty and education.

Locally we launched the Rotary/Gateway Teen Institute to teach anti drug leadership skills to young people before they get hooked on drugs. Our successful pilot summer camp in 2006 will lead to a successful model for anti drug partnerships around the country. There are so many other projects and achievements the past year that space can hardly contain them. District Rotarians raised more than \$400,000 in current dollars and received over \$2 million in future dollars from major donors and bequests. This level of giving made us the number one per capita district in the U.S., and our bequests will ensure that Rotary continues to be a major force for positive change in our community (both local and global) for many years to come.

If you are not already a Rotarian, I ask you to join me and the 1,400 "important people doing important things" that we call District 7300 Rotarians.

I am looking forward to the opportunity to serve you. Rotary has had a tremendous first century of service, and the next century will offer even greater opportunities. Working together, we truly can make a greater difference in our communities and the international communities we serve.

Rotary is club-driven. My role is to support club activities and encourage and guide whenever necessary. We have developed excellent educational programs to assist club development. We would also like Rotarians to consider becoming benefactors to the Foundation. Many members are beginning to allocate substantial gifts in their wills to help fund future projects.



Gateway Rehabilitation and District 7300 formed a partnership to present a program that equips teens with the tools to identify and develop their talents to impact their communities through drug prevention, leadership and service. The newly christened Rotary-Gateway Teen Leadership Institute features a summer camp experience to help students who might be at risk to make good choices, support teen leaders who choose to stay drug-free and encourage teen leaders to promote positive choices among their peers.

The camp was held in July 2006 at the Moon Township campus of Robert Morris University. District 7300 has made a \$27,000 commitment to this great work.






Expanded Public Relations Outreach
